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Celebrate Mercy Otis Warren is Launched!

On March 27, 2024, Celebrate Mercy Otis Warren presented its first program at the Plymouth Public Library to a large and enthusiastic crowd. Historical interpreters Michele Gabrielson, as Mercy Otis Warren, and Michael LePage, as John Adams, presented a dialogue between these two longtime "frenemies" over Mercy's portrayal of John in her landmark book, "History of the Rise, Progress, and Termination of the American Revolution." Mercy, possessed of a clear vision and a formidable intellect, and with the support and encouragement of her husband, James Warren, had begun writing on behalf of the Patriot cause as early as 1772. Initially, John Adams was very supportive of her efforts; Mercy carried on an extensive correspondence, beginning in 1774, with both John and his wife, Abigail Adams, among other pivotal supporters of the Patriot cause.



In 1805, decades after the war's end, she published her history of the Revolution, the first to be written by an American woman. By that time, Mercy and John Adams' political views had sharply diverged. Mercy was insistent on the importance of "republicanism" and individual rights, opposing any inclination towards an aristocracy, whether of birth or of occupation, and intent on avoiding any hint of an authoritarian government. John Adams was firmly in the Federalist camp, advocating the creation of a strong federal government. These divergent views of America's future influenced Mercy's portrayal of the leaders of the American Revolution. When John Adams read Mercy's history, he was shocked and offended that Mercy had not awarded him the pivotal role that he felt he deserved, claiming that her view of the Revolution had been skewed by her later political beliefs. He wrote her a series of lengthy, querulous letters criticizing every aspect of her book, criticism which she calmly rebutted

In the Library presentation, the disintegration of this long friendship was brilliantly portrayed in a dialogue based on the written words of Mercy Otis Warren and John Adams themselves. Michele and Michael, as Mercy and John, brought passion and intellect and verisimilitude to their representations of these two starcrossed friends, who agreed on a cause but not its results. It was a moving performance that brought the fervor and intensity of the debate over the future of the American colonies and the type of government we would eventually enjoy to life.

Our thanks to Michele and Michael, to the Plymouth Public Library, and to all those friends, new and old, who turned out to support our new organization, dedicated to bringing visibility to Plymouth's own Revolutionary heroine, Mercy Otis Warren.


Here's a mention about a favorite summer treat! If any brave soul would like to try adapting this lovely cool summer dessert for today's kitchen (perhaps by using an electric mixer), please let us know the results. (Mercy would be so proud!)

Raspberry Cream

Take a quart of thick sweet cream and boil it two or three wallops,* then take it off the fire and strain some juices of raspberries into it to your taste, stir it a good while before you put your juice in, that it may be almost cold, when you put it to it, and afterwards stir it one way for almost a quarter of an hour; then sweeten it up to your taste and when it is cold you may send it up.*

* A wallop is the bubbling motion made by rapidly boiling water, hence the duration of one such motion used as a measure of time in cooking.

* The dessert is being "sent up" to the dining room from the kitchen.
